The Honorees



An important civil rights activist of the 1960s and 1970s and a campaigner for over 30 years, **Hazel Nell Duker** is a leading figure in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and served as the organization's national president between 1989 and 1992. Later she was named president of the New York City Branch of the NAACP in 1999. Dr. Hazel N. Duker currently serves as President of the NAACP New York State Conference and a member of the NAACP National Board of Directors, a member of the NAACP Executive Committee and an active member of various NAACP board sub-committees. Dr. Duker is a woman of great strength and courage. Her dedication to human rights and equality is exemplified by her role linking business, government and social causes. Dr. Duker is a dynamic leader who is known for her unselfish and devoted track record for improving the quality of life in New York State. She currently serves as Chairperson of the Health Committee for Community Board 10 Manhattan.



Lynne Holden, M.D., is the president and chief executive officer of Mentoring in Medicine, Inc., in the Bronx, N.Y. She has established an all-volunteer organization that encourages and nurtures disadvantaged students from Harlem and the South Bronx in New York City to enter the health professions. Reaching students as young as first grade, Mentoring in Medicine introduces students to a wide range of health professions and provides mentoring, academic enrichment and leadership development to set them on the path toward health careers. In addition to the personal contact with health professionals, students also have opportunities to deliver health education in the community. Holden has created a movement that motivates and supports nearly 6,000 students and engages nearly 500 health care professional volunteers. Dr. Holden currently practices emergency medicine at Montefiore Medical Center in the Bronx.



Dr. Thomas Farley was appointed New York City Health Commissioner in May 2009. One of the world's oldest and largest public health agencies, the department has an annual budget of \$1.6 billion and more than 6,000 staff. In recent years the agency has undertaken a number of innovative initiatives, including a comprehensive tobacco control program, the elimination of trans fats in restaurant food, a requirement for chain restaurants to post calorie information on menu boards, and development of an electronic health record.

Before joining the Agency, Dr. Farley was chair of the Department of Community Health Sciences at the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine. Trained as a pediatrician, he served in the Centers for Disease Control's Epidemic Intelligence Service and worked for the CDC and the Louisiana Office of Public Health from 1989 to 2000. During that period he directed programs to control various infectious diseases. He has conducted research and published articles on a wide range of topics, including Legionnaires' disease, prevention of HIV/STDs, infant mortality, and obesity.
